## Copyright: Some Basics for the CBU Community

The issues of copyright and fair use will never be simple and likely will continue to change. The best that users of copyrighted materials can do is either get permission or use their best judgment and make good-faith efforts to comply with fair use rules. Many universities have developed rules-of-thumb that faculty and staff can refer to when using copyrighted materials. We at Plough Library want to provide some resources to guide the CBU community when considering the use of copyrighted materials. Because of the limitations of this newsletter, we have included an insert with the rules-of-thumb of the University of Texas system. This can be used as a handy guide in many circumstances. ## Public Services/Interlibrary

We have noticed that only about 10-15% of our faculty and staff use the Interlibrary Loan service each year. We want to make sure that you are aware of it and how it works.

### What we do

If a book or journal article needed for your research is unavailable at CBU, Interlibrary Loan can arrange to borrow it for you from another library. All you have to do is place a request. Take a look at <http://www.cbu.edu/library/services/ill/index.htm> for the full story.

## Circulation

Library and circulation rules to remember:

**Users MUST present a valid CBU ID card or special user card to check out materials.**



### Books

Undergraduate students and special users have a 28-day check out period and may check out up to 20 items. CBU faculty, staff, and graduate students may keep items until the end of the current semester. Fees for books are .10 a day.

### Media (videos, DVDs, and CDs)

Videos, DVDs, and CDs are only available for use by CBU students, faculty and staff.

Videos, DVDs, and audio CDs circulate for 3 days.

Only two 3-day circulating titles (videos, DVDs, and audio CDs) may be checked out at a time.

Overdue fines are \$1 per day with a maximum of \$25 per item

--If an item is lost, the patron will be subject to replacement and processing fees.

--Transcripts and diplomas are held for library obligations.

## New Reference Books

We acquired several new reference sets this summer. In the Reference room: the *Encyclopedia of Clothing and Fashion*, the *Encyclopedia of White-Collar and Corporate Crime*, and *The Chicago Guide to Writing About Numbers*. Choice Reviews describes this last book as "a holistic and accessible approach to understanding the issues in communicating numerical information.... ### *New Databases Alert!*

Continuing our commitment to provide the best research tools to CBU users, Plough Library has acquired several new electronic resources for the coming school year. These include:

**MergentOnline** - MergentOnline is a suite of global business and financial information products from Mergent Inc. (formerly Moody's). It includes U.S. Company Data for 10,000 public companies and their SEC filings, International Company Data, U.S. Annual Reports, and International Annual Reports. *Licensed for 3 simultaneous users.*

**ReferenceUSA** - ReferenceUSA has entries for over 12 million US businesses of all sizes, including directory data and information on type of business, sales volume, number of employees, executive names and titles, and stock exchange information.

**Communication & Mass Media Complete** - EBSCO's Communication & Mass Media Complete provides selective full text and references in all areas related to communication and mass media.

**PsychARTICLES** - EBSCO's PsychARTICLES provides full-text, citations, and abstracts to articles from journals published by the APA Educational Publishing Foundation and others. It covers general psychology and specialized, basic, applied, clinical, and theoretical research in psychology - in areas including animal behavior, cognition, memory, neuroscience, and social psychology.

**FirstSearch Databases** - We have access to several FirstSearch databases this year. These include Applied Science & Technology Index, BasicBIO-

SIS, Biological & Agricultural Index, Chemical Abstracts Student Edition, Dissertation Abstracts Online, Environmental Sciences & Pollution Management, GEOBASE, Philosopher's Index, and Social Sciences Index.

**Gale Virtual Reference Library** - Gale Virtual Reference Library contains searchable, electronic editions of 12 reference books on subjects including business, environment, history, medicine, multicultural studies, religion, and science.

**...and coming soon: JSTOR** - JSTOR offers long runs of backfiles of scholarly journals. Subjects covered include Anthropology, Ecology, Economics, Education, Finance, History, Mathematics, Philosophy, Political Science, Population Studies, and Sociology.

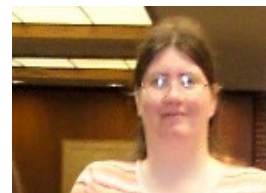
