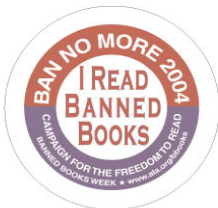
As we welcome new and returning students to the new Voyager system, we would also like to give all library patrons a word of caution. With a new catalog and automation system, searching for items should be more effective than ever. However, it also changes security issues within the library. The new library catalog offers each patron his own account in order to keep track of charged items, requests, fines, etc. This is available on a web catalog, so it is viewable to the next person who uses that particular pc if it is still logged on. In order to ensure privacy, patrons must click the logout link located at the bottom of their account. Also, the library staff would like to remind all patrons that a library card is very similar to a credit card.

Can't find what you need at Plough Library? Not to worry, most of Memphis is at your fingertips. As part of the Memphis Library Consortium, students, faculty and staff have the ability to checkout materials from other Memphis libraries. The list includes University of Memphis, Crichton College, Memphis College of Art, Rhodes College, Memphis Theological Seminary, Mid-America Baptist Theological Seminary and Southwest Tennessee Community College. You will need a CBU student ID in order to get privileges at these libraries. This agreement does not extend to the online databases, but it will help you locate print materials that CBU might not have. So, the next time you run into a dead end on your research, take advantage of this opportunity and peruse some of the web catalogs of the other libraries in Memphis. New Book Location is Back!!!

Since the summer, the New Books section of the library was temporarily discontinued due to new carpet and the installation of the new catalog. However, new books are back. The New Books section is located on the Main floor of the library across from journals and magazines.

Due to high demand, new books can only be checked out for fourteen days. *Come and browse the new books.*

netLibrary

Before the library migrated to the Voyager management system, it was cumbersome to access netlibrary. With the new system, when you conduct a search, netLibrary items are included in the results list. You just click on the netLibrary link and go directly to the item. You are able to browse the item at this point but you must create an account on the netLibrary page in order to check out the item for four hours. Don't forget the search tab which allows you to find a specific word in the text of the book. Check out the knowledge tools and notes tabs too.

Study Guides and Clep/ Books in netLibrary

We have noticed an increase in the number of students asking for various study guides and CLEP items. We have many such item in the Plough library book collection that are available for check out. However, netLibrary is a good option . If you conduct a search in the Buc Cat online catalog you will find that there are numerous study guides

Log out

It is possible for a person to incur a large fine—hundreds of dollars—on a lost or stolen library card.

Please be aware that students are held accountable for any fines incurred at any library participating in the Memphis Consortium of Libraries; all fines must be paid before graduation. Along the same lines, Plough Library discourages anyone allowing friends to check out books on his or her ID. Although you must be present at the time of checkout and approve the transaction, the library can hold only the card holder responsible for any resulting charges.

Elect to Read A Banned Book



September 25 - October 2

Observed annually since 1982, Banned Book Week reminds Americans not to take for granted their precious freedom to read. It is a time to reflect on the importance of ensuring the availability of unorthodox or unpopular viewpoints to all who wish to read them. Book censorship is neither

infrequent nor an issue of the past. Every year, books with clear artistic and cultural merit are still challenged by those who want to control what others read.

The American Library Association list of the most frequently challenged books includes these titles:

 “I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings” by Maya Angelou

 “Of Mice and Men” by John Steinbeck

Check Out Literature Online Reference Edition

Literature Online Reference Edition is a fully searchable, ever-growing collection of literature resources, ranging from author biographies, student guides and dictionaries of literary terms to specialist research materials such as current full-text journals and bibliographic citations.

Updated monthly, *Literature Online Reference Edition* features a browsable contents list, the ability to archive your work between sessions, a quick search that searches all database content, and advanced searching options for narrower searches. On the library home site, click on CBU Databases; literature; then Literature Online.
